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		The Safe Outcome Group will be chaired by Social			
		Care and Wellbeing, Aberdeen City Council. It will			
		lead on Child Protection, link with the Violence			
		Against Women Partnership.			
		 The Healthy and Active Outcome Group will be 			
		chaired by NHS Grampian. It will lead on Alcohol			
		and Drugs, CAMHS, Health Promoting Schools			
		and GP Clusters.			
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The Nurtured Outcome Group will be chaired by Education, Culture and Sport, Aberdeen City Council. It will lead the Getting the Best Start in Life, Early Years Improvement Programme and include Children Affected by Domestic Abuse.	
The Achieving Outcome Group will be chaired by Education, Culture and Sport, Aberdeen City Council. It will lead on Closing the Gap, LAC, Throughcare and Aftercare, Transitions for young People with ASN and the Youth Employment Partnership.	
The Responsible Outcome Group will be chaired by Police Scotland. It will lead on Youth Justice.	
The Respected and Included Outcome Group will be co-chaired by ACVO and the Aberdeen City Youth Council. It will lead on Engagement, Participation Strategy and Young Carers.	
This new structure will enable us to capture the range of work required to improve the outcomes for children and young people and will ensure we are able to continue to meet the statutory reporting requirements set out in ICS Planning Guidance.	
The new structure will enable all partners to take a lead role across each of the Outcome Groups.	
All Outcome Groups will work to an improvement agenda, based on the Framework of Quality Indicators for evaluating services for Children and Young People. Using the same set of quality indicators reinforces the partnership between internal and external evaluation of services.	
The Outcome Groups will continue to meet 6 times per year.	

It is important to note that, while all Outcome Groups report to the Integrated Children's Services Board, the Aberdeen City Child Protection Committee (Safe Outcome Group) has separate governance arrangements. The Aberdeen City Child Protection Committee is accountable to the Chief Executive Officer Group (Public Protection). This group is responsible for the leadership, direction and scrutiny of the Child Protection Committee.	
The Performance Monitoring Group will become the Improvement and Performance Group. This group will consist of the ICS Lead Officers and colleagues who come together annually to produce the Children and Young People Audit. This group will focus on reporting to the Quality Indicators framework. It is proposed that this group will be chaired by the Head of Children's Services, Social Care and Wellbeing.	
The Improvement and Performance Group will also meet 6 times per year.	
 Membership of the new ICS Board should be updated to include the new Chair of the Improvement and Performance Group.

National Strategic Policy Drivers	4.1 Children and Young People (Scotland) Bill – Update A paper from NHS Grampian was circulated with the agenda papers which provided a helpful update on the progress of the Bill. The Bill is now at stage 3 and the Scottish Government is planning for Royal Assent in summer 2014. PL indicated that he would like to understand more about the background to the changes. 4.2 Welfare Reform – Update PL gave an update on Welfare Reform. Two papers were circulated at the meeting: one page of the Dashboard report and a snapshot of the report to Community Planning Aberdeen. All projects are on track and a number of successes were highlighted: hub and satellite approach to information and advice sessions; launch of food banks / link with Accord Card to alert services to families in most need; creation of four money advice posts; successful bids for external funding for new posts. PL advised that the Welfare Reform Board has been updated to Welfare Matters. It is a cross-cutting team with a priority focus to work together on financial inclusion and worklessness. The Children 's Commissioner has seen the document and identified that it would is useful as an analytical and reporting tool for the C and YP Bill.			
		PL indicated that the Audit is useful at the start of every year to assist with future planning. SP also acknowledged the process is useful in reviewing progress and identifying			

		trends. GMac advised that Police Scotland analyse data and report quarterly to the Scottish Government.
